The ACLS crash cart guidelines simply state the carts should be "in sufficient number to meet potential care needs." Depending on the number of patients the healthcare facility cares for on any given day, on any given floor, or in any given unit, the number of crash carts may vary.

Acls Guidelines For Crash Carts

Ideally, crash carts are standardized. The top drawer of the cart has three boxes of atropine; the prepackaged injection in each box contains 1 mg. Give these patients 0.5 mg—or half-of the injection to speed up the heart. This same dose can be repeated, if necessary, every 3 to 5 minutes for a maximum dose of 3 mg.

Crash Carts. The crash cart is the commonly used term to describe a self-contained, mobile unit that contains virtually all of the materials, drugs, and devices necessary to perform a code. The configuration of crash carts may vary, but most will be a waist high or chest high wheeled cart with many drawers.
